



4 Proclaim Hope


WAYS TO PRACTICE PROCLAIMING HOPE AT HOME


Hope is waiting faithfully as God fulfills God's promises to us through Jesus Christ. Instead of just keeping this hope to ourselves, it is one of our most important callings as people of God to proclaim this hope to the world, sharing the good news of Jesus Christ as the angels and shepherds did long ago.

- Sing Christmas carols together that proclaim the good news of Jesus' birth. Some possibilities are: "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing," "Away in a Manger," "The First Noel," "Angels We Have Heard on High," and "Go Tell It On the Mountain."
- Watch the video *A Charlie Brown Christmas* (Warner Bros., 1965) or the clip from the movie about the true meaning of Christmas on YouTube at "A Charlie Brown Christmas—True Meaning" (bit.ly/FMTrueMeaning, 1:50). Then watch "Charlie Brown Christmas Dance" (bit.ly/FMChristmasDance, 3:02) and dance with Charlie Brown's friends.
- Gather family and/or friends in a circle and tell the story of Jesus' birth, taking turns one or two sentences at a time. Allow for creative details to be added. Prompt with questions such as "What happened next?" or "What did they do then?"
- The star was a symbol of hope for the magi who followed it to find Jesus and worship him. Make stars and write a word that would give hope to you or others. Give your "star words" to others proclaiming hope. Some words might be: *believe, wonder, trust, promises, faith*, and so forth.


God of hope, thank you for the gift of Jesus, hope for the world. May we proclaim that good news far and wide. Amen.

BIBLE STORY



Based on Luke 2:8-20
