GRACE NOTES



It's easy to see examples of faith in the big events of the world...

Just a couple of days ago, there were headlines across the U.S. and around the world lamenting the death of professional basketball great Kobe Bryant, his daughter Gigi, and seven other people in a helicopter flying over fog-shrouded hills in southern California.

Since the initial reports, tributes and memorials have filled the newspapers, magazines, sports radio, and myriad cable channels. They speak of many wonderful aspects of Kobe's life, his generosity, his work ethic, and his family life. But only now are a few people bringing up some less savory stories from his past, including sexual assault charges from 2003.

All of this combined to remind us of one expression of our faith – **redemption**. Mentioning this sports celebrity's shortcomings does not necessarily diminish his stature – in fact, it might indicate the presence of God's Spirit at work. We should never idolize someone like Kobe Bryant because he was considered "perfect." We can, however, appreciate even more what he accomplished because he overcame faults that could have held him back; he worked at becoming a better person. That's what we call **redemption**.

But there's more – it involves **forgiveness**. Kobe played for the Los Angeles Lakers for twenty-one years, winning five world championships. His most famous teammate was Shaquille O'Neal, the Hall of Fame center. Part of the time they were close friends, but they also had a well-known feud that lasted for years before they made up in 2015. When he heard of Kobe's death, O'Neal was devastated by the loss of his friend and his young daughter. But in only one day, Shaq made a major life change – he called all the people he had disagreements with and put an end to any conflicts. He said, "Look, I'm all about being hard and all that, but after yesterday, I'm going to have to delete...my confrontation clause. I don't want to do that anymore because you never know." In addition to those he called to settle conflicts with, he also called his best friend and made a promise to check in on his other friends more.

It's sad that it often takes something serious, like the death of a friend, to remember how precious our friendships and relationships are – in the end, **forgiveness** is easier than conflict and better reflects our faith.


We were all visitors once and remember how it feels to try a new place of worship. Visitors are welcome at all GCPC events, classes and small groups as well as in worship.

Sharing the Blessing Cup: Meeting Jesus at the Sermon on the Mount

An Ash Wednesday Spirituality Center Experience Wednesday, February 26, 4-7pm

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the Season of Lent when we pause to reflect on our relationship with God. It is a time of honesty as we humbly admit to God our humanness and give thanks for our blessings. This year, you can experience Jesus through his own words as found in the sermon on the mount and through the ritual of the blessing cup. The Blessing Cup ritual was developed in 1979 by Fr. Rock Travnikar, a Franciscan priest. He wrote the rituals to encourage the sharing of our deepest feelings with God and others.

Come for a time of personal reflection, worship as a family or with a friend. You will move from center to center to meditate on Jesus' words and enjoy simple practices that will set you on your Lenten journey. Come when you can and stay as long as you like.

The spirituality centers will be set up in the Sanctuary from 4-7pm. Rev. Sue and Mitch will share the imposition of ashes at the end of your worship time.

Best Choice Labels collected for Kid's Day Out

WHAT?

We are now collecting the UPC portion of the BEST CHOICE label (beginning with 70038) to redeem for 3 cents each from the Save a Label Program. YES - that is \$30 for 1000 labels. Previously, IHN collected these labels, but do not anymore. These funds will go toward supporting Grace Covenant's Kid's Day Out program. This in-house program is funded thru student registrations and Grace Covenant.

WHERE?

Look for the Doll House outside Patrick Bell's office and place your labels in there. Cut the UPC from labels, bags, or cartons. For glass items with a glue label, the labels can be removed by first soaking in warm water. Some products are excluded from the Program, including aluminum soda cans (UPCs from 12-pk soda cardboard cartons are acceptable), aerosol cans, and cigarettes. Don't bother with Always Save labels or Boxtops – we will throw those away.

WHEN?

First look for the Best Choice products usually available at Price Chopper and Hen House. Then consider buying these items. The quality is the same as name brand but are priced lower since they don't carry the same advertising or promotional costs that name brand items do. Gather your labels at home in a plastic bag or envelope you might be recycling and put them in our doll house when you come to church.

WHO?

We'll be asking for volunteers on a periodic basis to trim if needed and count the labels into 1000 groups so we can submit them.



Clerk's Corner

Session met on January 20, 2020, in room 5, with Reverend Sue Trigger serving as moderator. In addition to the elders, Deacon Liz Chandler was present. Dave Stalling shared a devotion based on Psalm 35 and a reading shared in 1774 at the Continental Congress calling for wisdom in making decisions and led us in prayer.

Special business: Tim Hayden asked who was responsible for replacing the Peace Pole in the front courtyard. The barbecue contest raised funds for the replacement but not enough to cover the whole cost. The Facilities team was assigned the responsibility.

Consent agenda: The minutes of the December stated Session meeting and the December 22, 2019,





Team minutes: The Personnel team submitted a motion to amend the inclement weather policy in the bylaws to say that the church office would be open on days when the Blue Valley school district declared a late start. The motion carried. The Worship team submitted motion to invite Dr. William Brown to fill the pulpit on April 19. The motion carried. The Facilities team reported that they did not have to use the line of credit for facilities projects in 2019. Because of the severe budget shortfall predicted for 2020, there are no facilities improvements/projects planned. The Finance team reported that we received 118 pledges, compared to 158 in 2019, totaling \$524,354. There were 44 pledging units that pledged last year that didn't pledge this year. With those projected revenues, the Finance team said the Asking Budget approved in November 2019 would result in a \$250,000 deficit. Serious cuts to the budget would have to be made. A motion was made to rescind the 2020 Asking Budget and move back to the 2019 budget until we can gather more information. The motion carried. A motion was made to present the 2020 Asking Budget to the congregation at the Annual Meeting so that members understand that the present level of pledges would mean cutting staff and programming severely. That motion also carried.

Clerk's report: We started the year with 412 members (the number is slightly different from the previous Clerk's Corner because of Calvin Spence's death and a few members slated to be removed asked to be retained on the rolls). With the death of Sally Hinchman, the transfer of Carolyn Thomas to COR and Michael Johnson asking to be removed, that leaves us with 409 members.

Co-Pastors' report: There were no questions about the co-pastors' report. Sue reported they are focusing on plans for Visioning Day (February 29). Also, Sue and Mitch will be leading a four-week Sunday school class in Heartland Hall beginning on February 2 about tools for talking about tough issues.

Deacons' report: Liz Chandler reported the deacons are very pleased that their responsibilities have been redefined to a more manageable level. She said the deacon training went well. Through the efforts of a handful of members, the kitchen has been thoroughly cleaned, painted and newly decorated. She would like some attention paid to the landscaping and lights around the monument sign on the corner.

Old business: Nominating Team – Harold Frye reported that the Nominating Team is full and ready to start working on elder candidates.


After sharing some joys and concerns of the congregation, the meeting was adjourned at 9:05pm and Rev. Sue closed the meeting with a prayer.



EXCITING NEWS: Dr. Bill Brown, April 17–18, Village Environmental Action Committee and Heartland Earthkeepers of Heartland Presbytery have invited **Rev. Dr. William Brown** to KC. Dr. Brown is professor of Old Testament at Columbia Theological Seminary. He is a faithful environmentalist and has been asked to preach and teach about earth care before the 50th Anniversary of Earth Day. Saturday morning, April 18, he plans to discuss **Faith & Science and Creation & Climate Change**.
