Visitors delight us.



Triennium saw our youth join with thousands of youth from across the nation to do Bible study, open up to each other about the challenges they face, and to enjoy worship and recreation like nothing else they've experienced. The biggest challenge was housing with no air conditioning!



Mission Co-Workers Speak for Global Advocacy — Part I

The names of Christi and Jeff Boyd, two of our Mission co-workers, appear weekly in the Sunday bulletin in the section of the bulletin that requests, "Remember the following in prayer." Both serve in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). In a 2018 Presbyterian Mission publication,



called "Crisis in Cameroon," Jose Luis Casal, Director of World Mission, stated that Mission co-workers "work alongside global partners to address poverty, hopelessness, violence, and other pressing problems in the name of Jesus Christ."

This article includes information from an article published in the spring 2019 issue of *Mission Crossroads*. Jeff Boyd, one of the authors of the article, "Mission as Advocacy," serves in the role of World Mission's Regional Liaison for Central Africa. The second author, Douglas Tilton serves in the same role in Southern Africa and Madagascar. The first words of the article, "Congo Mission Network creates energy in faithbased advocacy," introduce the content of this article.

According to Boyd and Tilton, the Congo Mission Network includes representatives of congregations, presbyteries, other Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) entities, as well as concerned individuals. The authors emphasized that the Network had a long history of recognizing the call to work for justice and peace in the DRC. In 2018, on Congo Advocacy Day, Network participants met with staff members in 18 congressional offices, including those of the Democratic and Republican leadership of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. They asked congressional representatives to expedite the passage of HR 6207, the Democratic Republic of the Congo Democracy and Accountability Act of 2018. The Network made other requests not included in this article.

Part II of the article will summarize the proposed bill, HR 6207 and its significance to the DRC.

Pew Dwellers Health Notes

Two Health Questions — Am I at Risk for Type 2 Diabetes? — Part VI

A lipid panel, completed as part of health status evaluations, may help the individual and health care provider achieve the following:

1. Plan ways to prevent th development of major health problems such as a stroke or heart attack.



2. Determine the existence of abnormal lipid panel results, along with other symptoms, that indicate the presence of one or more major diseases.

According to the second edition of the Mayo Clinic *The Essential Diabetes Book*, higher levels of lipids in the blood help clarify if an individual has the metabolic syndrome. This syndrome's classic group of signs and symptoms, that occur together, include abdominal obesity, hypertension, high blood sugar, low levels of high density cholesterol (HDL), and high triglyceride levels.

A lipid panel is a test that measures fats and fatty substances found in the blood. These fats, stored in tissues, provide sources of energy in the body. As described by lipid panel test instructional information in 2019, fats consist of cholesterol, high-density lipoprotein (HDL), low-density lipoprotein (LDL), and triglycerides.

Part VII, and final article in this series, will address more details about the functions of cholesterol and triglycerides that relate to the risk factors for the development of type 2 diabetes.

Our series continues — identifying PCUSA programs the session of GCPC has committed to. The Peacemaking commitment outlines that we as a congregation work in eight areas of ministry. We have visited Worship, Prayer and Bible Study, Study and Respond to Global issues, Peacemaking in Families, and Community Ministries and Receiving the Peacemaking Offering.

Peacemaking

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Commitment to Peacemaking

Since April 25, 1986, Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church has been one of the over 4,500 congregations to make the Commitment to Peacemaking. Every year, on World Communion Sunday, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) also



observes Peacemaking Sunday. In the past few years, the PC(USA) has expanded that to observing a Season of Peace, which this year runs from September 1 through October 6. If you wonder what all this means, take a look at the commitment that was signed back in 1986.

Responding to God's Covenant, Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church now commits itself to peacemaking. In fulfilling this commitment, we will do peacemaking through:

- WORSHIP: provide worship that expresses the reality of God's peace giving;
- **PRAYER AND BIBLE STUDY:** encourage prayer, Bible study, and spiritual disciplines that nurture and deepen the spiritual life of the community and equip people to share the gospel message of peace to the world;
- PEACEMAKING IN FAMILIES AND IN COMMUNITY LIVING: create opportunities for people of all ages to develop peacemaking skills such as conflict resolution, mediation, or nonviolence training that will help them grow as peacemakers in their families, in the congregation, and in the community;
- **COMMUNITY MINISTRIES:** work with and support ecumenical and interfaith partners and other bodies in their pursuit of social, racial, and economic justice, to confront racism and all other forms of prejudice, and to respond to people in communities, local, national, and worldwide, who are caught in poverty, hurt by unemployment, or burdened by other problems;
- STUDY AND RESPONSE TO GLOBAL ISSUES: support human rights and economic justice efforts in at least one area of the world—through presbytery partnerships and sister countries;
- GLOBAL SECURITY: study global security concerns, work for worldwide arms control, and support alternatives to military solutions to international and civil conflicts;
- MAKING PEACE WITH THE EARTH: protect and restore the environment through study, advocacy, and individual and corporate lifestyle commitments;
- **RECEIVING THE PEACEMAKING OFFERING:** support financially the churchwide peacemaking effort by receiving the Peacemaking Offering and through other means.

The Session will provide leadership and support in its commitment to peacemaking.

During this year's Season of Peace, we're encouraged to reflect on:

- 1. What does it mean to commit to Peace?
- 2. Making peace by addressing root causes of poverty
- 3. Making peace by disrupting systematic racism
- 4. Making peace by ending violence
- 5. Making peace by supporting refugees and migrants
- 6. Partaking in peace in worship and at table this World Communion Sunday and through the Peace and Global Witness Offering
