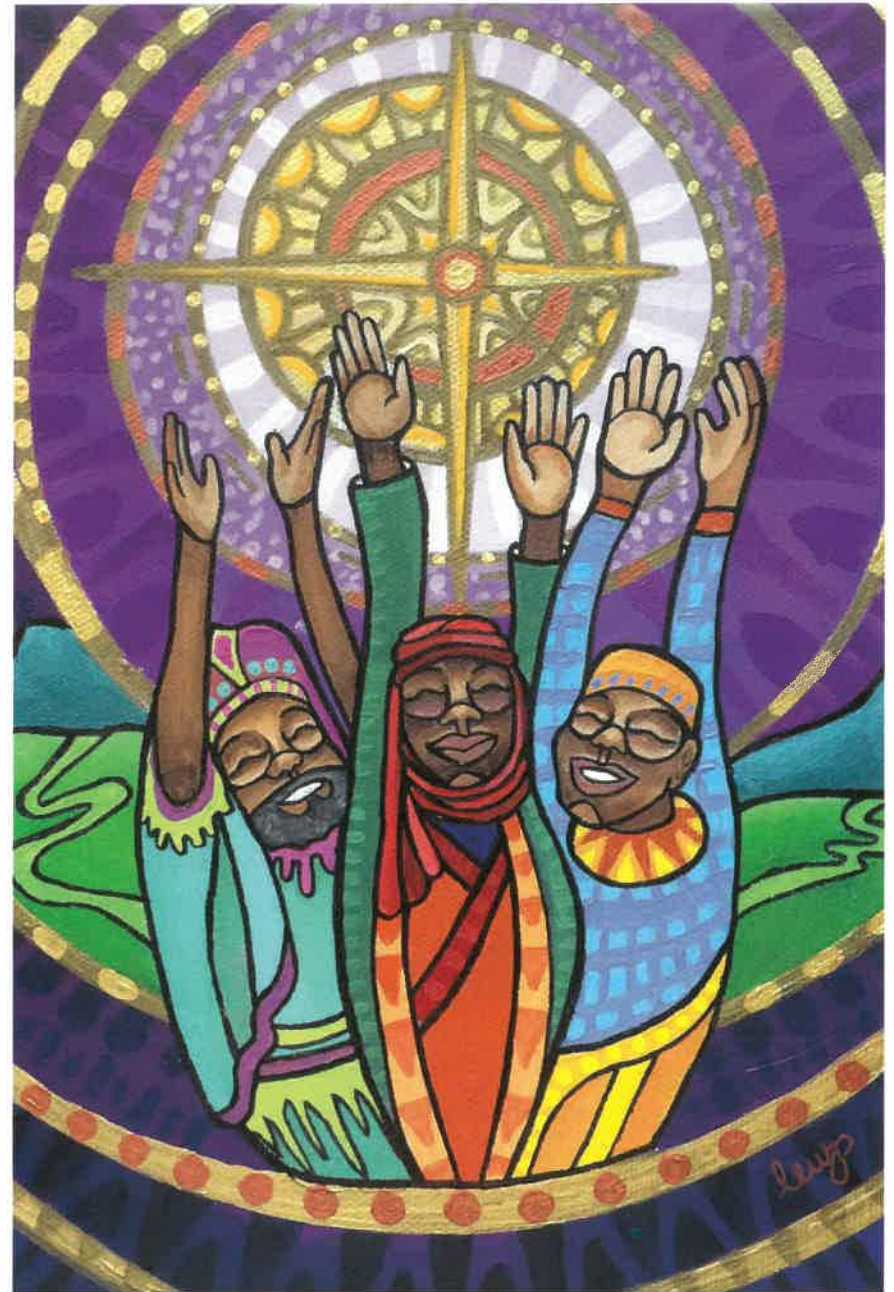

Rev. Meg Shoeman's career has been a long journey. Receiving her M.Div. in 2007 but not seeking ordination because of the ban on gays and lesbians, she worked at an animal shelter until being ordained in 2018 to the Children's Hospital of Alabama. A year later, she left this call and worked on a PRN basis as a chaplain at Hershey Medical Center, part-time at a coffee shop and also in a temporary pastoral position at the Market Square Presbyterian Church in Pennsylvania. When COVID shut the coffee shop down she lost critical income. Thankfully, an Emergency Assistance Grant from the Board of Pensions brought her both stability and peace of mind in a difficult time.
